Also, they should show creativity in determining what traits they think make Benjamin Franklin an exceptional American.

Short Answer:

The student's knowledge here should be from the reading. They should describe the Stamp Act in terms such as "It is called the Stamp Act because a stamp is placed on all paper products reminding the colonists that England is still in charge." Students should focus on taxes and the unfairness of it and may include Benjamin Franklin's fight against the Act.
